The Story

Paige, in her late teens, reflects on riding in the car with her grandmother. Even though her grandma was a safe driver, Paige often seemed to foresee a terrible accident. When her grandmother does die in a car accident, Paige feels her visions are the cause. (drama)

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SCARY VISIONS

(Late teens. She is recalling the recent unexpected death of her grandmother)

When I was little, I used to spend a lot of time with my grandmother. My mom and dad were always so busy. They didn't have jobs ... they had careers. So, any time she wanted to go for a ride out to the outlet mall or take a trip to her favorite restaurant way on the other side of town, I'd go along. She was a good driver — she never went over the speed limit or pulled out in front of oncoming traffic or anything like that. One time, we were going to get ice cream — at the good place that has extra thick waffle cones — and we had to go on the highway to get there. We were driving along and I got this really clear image of our car running off the road and crashing. It seemed so real. This little kid came out of nowhere, and, even though my gramma stopped like three feet away from him and he didn't get hurt at all — in my mind, I saw her smash into him and send his little body flying like twenty feet.
