TIME: The action takes place in the 1980s, at various locations around Hollywood, California, over a two-week span.

SETTING

The stage consists of three sections. One side of the stage is the area for the talk show sets. There is a stage-side entrance. The furniture includes a desk, chairs, and small tables which will be used in combinations. Television cameras and audio equipment may be employed to enhance the sets.

The other side of the stage is the Dale Security Agency office, with two desks and three or four chairs. The desks have telephones. There is an UPS door to the street. In front of the curtain and to one side is a multi-purpose area that consists of two chairs and a table.

ACT I Scene 1

(AT RISE: Greenroom for the Patty Pleasance talk show. Lights come up on the multi-purpose area. The table is in the corner, behind the chairs, which are perpendicular to each other. Several magazines are on the table. ELMO FINSTETTER and DANNY MOSS enter. Elmo has long hair, tight pants, a barely buttoned shirt, and a gold necklace. He carries a small bag. Danny is dressed in a suit and carries a briefcase.)

ELMO: What've you got me into this time, Danny? DANNY: Exposure, baby. The kind you can't buy.

ELMO: Who needs it? Did you see all those chicks outside mobbing me? They do that all the time.

DANNY: But that's only a tiny fraction of all rock fans. They buy a small percentage of your records. You need fans of all ages. And I'm not sure I like your getting mobbed. You lost a gold chain.

ELMO: It was just one of the cheap ones I wear when I'm out. If it gets lost, no big deal. Let me worry about getting mobbed. It's one of the sacrifices, right? I mean, if I have to suffer through a wet kiss or two, or I'm forced to stare at t-shirts and tight jeans, I guess I'll do it. That's the kind of exposure I like.

DANNY: You need this kind, too, Elmo. Network television exposure. That last album of yours hasn't broken gold yet. Go through the motions, will you? Trust me, OK?

ELMO: For a lousy four hundred and fifty bucks.

DANNY: Right. Minimum scale. Of which I get a whopping forty-five. So don't complain.

ELMO: It's a waste of time, Danny. And I don't even get to do a number. Just sit there, right? It's dumb.

DANNY: It's like I told you. Patty Pleasance does her own singing. Anyway, they can hear you sing anytime. What they want is to get to know you personally when Patty talks to you. Be nice this time, OK, Elmo? Don't blow it.

ELMO: Yeah. Yeah. But I don't want to be shown up by some flashy loser that comes on after me.

DANNY: Don't worry. Patty interviews her guests one at a time. Nobody else'll be on stage. Only the two of you.

ELMO: Lucky thing for her. Is she cute?

DANNY: Who?

ELMO: This Patty chick.

DANNY: What do I know? I'm only a talent agent.

(DEBBIE WEINTRAUB enters. She is young, plain, and perhaps a bit heavy. She wears glasses and carries a clipboard. ELMO looks her over but decides he's not interested.)

DEBBIE: Hi. I'm Debbie Weintraub, one of the talent coordinators.

ELMO: Great. I always wanted to have my talent coordinated.

DEBBIE: (A slight chuckle.) Is the greenroom comfortable enough for you? Do you want any makeup, Mr. Finstetter?

ELMO: No, thanks. (HE shakes his hair.) I'm gorgeous enough.

DEBBIE: (To DANNY.) He's kidding, of course.

DANNY: Don't ask. With Elmo, I never know.

ELMO: I want to know why there's no green in this greenroom.

DANNY: It's called a greenroom no matter what color it is.

DEBBIE: Make yourself at home here, Mr. Finstetter. Perhaps you'd like to read a magazine while you wait.

ELMO: Cool. (Picks up magazines and looks through them.)
Aw, these are no good. (Tosses them back on the table.)
There're no pictures of chicks ... except with their clothes on.

DANNY: Too bad, Elmo. We all have to make sacrifices.

DEBBIE: Uh, right. Anyway, I'll come get you when we're ready. The audience will be coming in shortly. After the warm-up we'll be ready to go.
